Protecting Our Collections

In 2014, the Grosse Pointe Historical Society was awarded a Collection Assessment Program (CAP) grant provided by Heritage Preservation and the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS). The grant paid for extensive evaluations of collections and buildings by professional assessors. 





A rarely seen Palm Beach-style 1929 mansion in Grosse Pointe Farms is the site for the Grosse Pointe Historical Society's 12th Summer Gala: Some Enchanted Evening. Proceeds from this event benefit the Society, which is celebrating its 70th anniversary of preserving Grosse Pointe history.

Snug under our new roof

The Provencal-Weir House has a new roof! When the house was restored in the 1990s, a cedar-shake roof was installed. Time and weather took their toll and the roof failed in 2014, causing minor interior damage. The

Provencal-Weir House is one of four designated historic sites in Grosse Pointe Farms. Changes to buildings

in these districts are under the supervision of the Historic District Commission. (read more about it at: http://www.grossepointefarms.org/about/about/historic-district)

The cost of a new wood roof was deemed prohibitive by the Grosse Pointe Historical Society board of directors. This led to several months of dialogue and hard work by the Farms staff, the Historic District Commissioners, and the GPHS board (led by committee chair, James Conway) and staff to find a satisfactory solution.

Historic District ordinances generally dictate that "replacement parts" should either be what was present when a building or district was designated "historic" (in our case, the wood roof), or should return to something which was an appropriate part of the building in the past.

The archives in the Moran Resource Center at GPHS provided many photos of the Provencal-Weir house in the late 19th and early 20th century, which show a standard, asphalt shingle roof. Eureka! A solution which met the requirements of the historic district ordinance, the discernment of the commissioners, and the practical realities of the GPHS budget.

This project illustrates the special challenges of historic preservation. The Grosse Pointes value history and have capable volunteers and professional municipal officials, who can work together for appropriate outcomes that preserve and protect our built environment.

If you were 192 years old ...

... you'd need a little rehab now and then, too!

The c. 1823 Provencal-Weir House is believed to the oldest surviving residence in the Pointes. The rooms are interpreted to represent different periods in history: the parlor representing 1850-60; the dining room, the 1910s; and the schoolroom c. 1900. The House contains furniture, paintings, prints, textiles, books and Native American artifacts.

Restored in the 1990s, the P-W House, as it is affectionately-known, needs ongoing maintenance and "stepped up" improvements to reflect better preservation and conservation tactics. Urgent work is needed at the P-W House:

•	Roof replacement	\$	9,000
•	Gutter, trim and ceiling repair	\$	3,500
•	UV-light filtering film on windows	\$	5,500
•	Interior storm windows	\$	7,800

Continued from cover environmental threats to the collections – in the areas of excess light and poorlycontrolled heating and cooling.

While the assessment was underway, the 25-year-old roof failed (see related story) Additional repairs to the exterior include gutters and downspout attention.

The recommended interior work includes UV-light filtering film on windows and interior storms windows which will allow for better air quality and regulation. Benefits include lower operating costs for energy and the primary goal of protecting the building and collections.
